Battery Information

⚠ WARNING

The temperature rating for the device may exceed the usable range of some batteries. Alkaline batteries can rupture at high temperatures.

NOTICE

Alkaline batteries lose a significant amount of their capacity as the temperature decreases. Use lithium batteries when operating the device in below freezing conditions.

Maximizing Battery Life

You can do several things to extend the life of the batteries.

- Reduce the backlight brightness (Adjusting the Backlight, page 6).
- · Reduce the backlight timeout (Display Settings, page 32).
- · Reduce the flashlight brightness or flash frequency (Using the Flashlight, page 29).
- Use battery save mode (Turning On Battery Save Mode, page 3).
- Use expedition mode (Turning On Expedition Mode, page 3).
- Turn off wireless connectivity (Wi-Fi Settings, page 33).
- Turn off Bluetooth[®] technology (Bluetooth Settings, page 33).
- · Turn off additional satellite systems (GPS and Other Satellite Systems, page 32).

Turning On Battery Save Mode

You can use battery save mode to prolong the battery life.

Select Setup > Display > Battery Save > On.

In battery save mode, the screen shuts off when the backlight times out. You can select the power key to turn on the screen.

Turning On Expedition Mode

You can use expedition mode to prolong the battery life. In expedition mode, the screen shuts off, the device enters low power mode, and the device collects fewer GPS track points.

- 1 Select Setup > Expedition Mode.
- 2 Select an option:
 - To enable the device to prompt you to turn on expedition mode when you turn off the device, select Prompted.
 - · To automatically turn on expedition mode after two minutes of inactivity, select Auto.
 - To never turn on expedition mode, select **Never**.

In expedition mode, the green LED flashes occasionally.

Long-Term Storage

When you do not plan to use the GPSMAP 66s/st device for several months, remove the batteries. Stored data is not lost when batteries are removed.

Installing Batteries

The GPSMAP 66s/st handheld device operates using two AA batteries (not included). Use NiMH or lithium batteries for best results.

NOTE: The GPSMAP 66sr is not compatible with AA batteries.

- 1 Turn the D-ring counter-clockwise, and pull up to remove the cover.
- 2 Insert two AA batteries, observing polarity.



3 Replace the battery cover, and turn the D-ring clockwise.

Installing a NiMH Battery Pack

The GPSMAP 66s/st device operates using a NiMH battery pack (optional) or two AA batteries (*Installing Batteries*, page 4).

NOTE: The GPSMAP 66sr is not compatible with the NiMH battery pack.

- 1 Turn the D-ring counter-clockwise, and pull up to remove the cover.
- 2 Locate the battery pack 1.



- 3 Insert the battery pack, observing polarity.
- 4 Gently press the battery pack into place.
- 5 Replace the battery cover, and turn the D-ring clockwise.

Charging the Battery Pack

NOTICE

To prevent corrosion, thoroughly dry the USB port, the weather cap, and the surrounding area before charging or connecting to a computer.

Do not attempt to use the device to charge a battery that was not provided by Garmin[®]. Attempting to charge a battery that was not provided by Garmin can damage the device and void the warranty.

Before you can connect the USB cable to your device, you may need to remove optional mount accessories.

NOTE: The device does not charge when outside the approved temperature range (*GPSMAP 66s/st Specifications*, page 42).

You can charge the battery using a standard wall outlet or a USB port on your computer.

1 Pull up the weather cap 1 from the USB port 2.



- 2 Plug the small end of the USB cable into the USB port on your device.
- 3 Plug the large end of the USB cable into an AC adapter or a computer USB port.
- 4 If necessary, plug the AC adapter into a standard wall outlet.
 When you connect the device to a power source, the device turns on.
- **5** Charge the battery completely.

Charging the GPSMAP 66sr Device

NOTICE

To prevent corrosion, thoroughly dry the USB port, the weather cap, and the surrounding area before charging or connecting to a computer.

NOTE: The device does not charge when it is outside the approved temperature range (*GPSMAP 66sr Specifications*, page 42).

1 Lift the weather cap 1.



- 2 Plug the small end of the power cable into the charging port ② on the device.
- 3 Plug the other end of the power cable into a compatible AC power adapter.
- 4 Plug the AC power adapter into a standard wall outlet.
- **5** Charge the device completely.

Turning On the Device

Hold ().

Turning On the Backlight

Select any key to turn on the backlight.

The backlight turns on automatically when alerts and messages are displayed.

Adjusting the Backlight

- 1 Select () to open the status page.
- 2 Use + and to adjust the brightness.

TIP: You can select NV to reduce the backlight intensity for compatibility with night vision goggles.

Buttons



FIND	Select to open the search menu. Hold to mark your current location as a man overboard (MOB) location and activate navigation.	
MARK	Select to save your current location as a waypoint.	
QUIT	Select to cancel or return to the previous menu or page. Select to scroll through the main pages.	
ENTER	Select to choose options and acknowledge messages. Select to control the current activity recording (from the Map, Compass, Altimeter, and Trip Computer pages).	
MENU	Select to open the options menu for the page that is currently open. Select twice to open the main menu (from any page).	
PAGE	Select to scroll through the main pages.	
	Select \triangle , \bigvee , \longrightarrow to select menu options and move the map cursor.	
+	Select to zoom in on the map.	
_	Select to zoom out on the map.	

Locking the Keys

You can lock the keys to prevent inadvertent key presses.

Select (> Lock Keys.

Acquiring Satellite Signals

It may take 30 to 60 seconds to acquire satellite signals.

- 1 Go outdoors to an open area.
- 2 If necessary, turn on the device.
- 3 Wait while the device searches for satellites.
 - ? flashes while the device determines your location.
 - in the status bar shows the satellite signal strength.

When the device acquires satellite signals, it automatically starts recording your path as an activity.

Using the Main Pages

The information needed to operate this device is found on the main menu, map, compass, trip computer, and altimeter pages.

Select **PAGE** or **QUIT** to scroll through the main pages.

Opening the Main Menu

The main menu gives you access to tools and setup screens for waypoints, activities, routes, and more (*Main Menu Tools*, page 24, *Setup Menu*, page 31).

From any page, select MENU twice.

Map

▲ represents your location on the map. As you travel, ▲ moves and displays your path. Depending on your zoom level, waypoint names and symbols may appear on the map. You can zoom in on the map to see more detail. When you are navigating to a destination, your route is marked with a colored line on the map.

Changing the Map Orientation

- 1 From the map, select MENU.
- 2 Select Map Setup > Orientation.
- 3 Select an option:
 - Select North Up to show north at the top of the page.
 - Select **Track Up** to show your current direction of travel at the top of the page.
 - Select **Automotive Mode** to show an automotive perspective with the direction of travel at the top.

Measuring Distance on the Map

You can measure the distance between multiple locations.

- 1 From the map, move the cursor to a location.
- 2 Select MENU > Measure Distance.
- **3** Select additional locations on the map.

Map Page Settings

From the map, select **MENU**.

Stop Navigation: Stops navigating the current route.

Map Setup: Enables you to open additional map settings (Map Settings, page 8).

Measure Distance: Allows you to measure the distance between multiple locations (Measuring Distance on the

Map, page 8).

Restore Defaults: Restores the map to factory default settings.

Map Settings

From the map, select **MENU**, and select **Map Setup**.

Configure Maps: Enables or disables the maps currently loaded on the device (Enabling Maps, page 9).

Orientation: Adjusts how the map is shown on the page (Changing the Map Orientation, page 8).

Dashboard: Sets a dashboard to display on the map. Each dashboard shows different information about your route or your location.

Guidance Text: Sets when the guidance text is shown on the map.

Advanced Setup: Enables you to open advanced map settings (Advanced Map Settings, page 9).

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Advanced Map Settings

From the map, select **MENU**, and select **Map Setup** > **Advanced Setup**.

Auto Zoom: Automatically selects the appropriate zoom level for optimal use on your map. When Off is selected, you must zoom in or out manually.

Detail: Selects the amount of detail shown on the map. Showing more detail may cause the map to redraw more slowly.

Shaded Relief: Shows detail relief on the map (if available) or turns off shading.

Vehicle: Sets the position icon, which represents your position on the map. The default icon is a small blue triangle.

Zoom Levels: Adjusts the zoom level at which map items appear. The map items do not appear when the map zoom level is higher than the selected level.

Text Size: Selects the text size for map items.

Enabling Maps

You can enable map products installed on your device.

- 1 From the map, select MENU > Map Setup > Configure Maps.
- 2 Select the toggle switch to enable each installed map.

Compass

When navigating, \land points to your destination, regardless of the direction you are moving. When \land points toward the top of the electronic compass, you are traveling directly toward your destination. If \land points any other direction, turn until it points toward the top of the compass.

Using the Compass


You can use the compass to navigate an active route.

- 1 Hold the device level.
- 2 Follow \(\bar{\pi} \) to your destination.

Course Pointer

The course pointer is most useful when you are navigating on water or where there are no major obstacles in your path. It can also help you avoid hazards near the course, such as shoals or submerged rocks.

To enable the course pointer, from the compass, select **MENU** > **Setup Heading** > **Go To Line (Pointer)** > **Course (CDI)**.



The course pointer ① indicates your relationship to the course line leading to the destination. The course deviation indicator (CDI) ② provides the indication of drift (right or left) from the course. The scale ③ refers to the distance between dots ④ on the course deviation indicator, which tell you how far off course you are.

Using the Main Pages 9

Navigating with Sight 'N Go

You can point the device at an object in the distance, lock in the direction, and navigate to the object.

- 1 Select Sight 'N Go.
- 2 Point the device at an object.
- 3 Select Lock Direction > Set Course.
- 4 Navigate using the compass.

Compass Settings

From the compass, select **MENU**.

Sight 'N Go: Allows you to point the device at an object in the distance, and navigate using the object as a reference point (*Navigating with Sight 'N Go*, page 10).

Stop Navigation: Stops navigating the current route.

Change Dashboard: Changes the theme and information displayed on the dashboard.

Set Scale: Sets the scale for the distance between the dots on the course deviation indicator.

Calibrate Compass: Allows you to calibrate the compass if you experience irregular compass behavior, for example, after moving long distances or after extreme temperature changes (*Calibrating the Compass*, page 10).

Setup Heading: Allows you to customize the compass heading settings (*Heading Settings*, page 10).

Change Data Fields: Customizes the compass data fields.

Restore Defaults: Restores the compass to factory default settings.

Calibrating the Compass

Before you can calibrate the electronic compass, you must be outdoors, away from objects that influence magnetic fields, such as cars, buildings, or overhead power lines.

The device has a 3-axis electronic compass. You should calibrate the compass after moving long distances, experiencing temperature changes, or changing the batteries.

- 1 From the compass, select MENU.
- 2 Select Calibrate Compass > Start.
- 3 Follow the on-screen instructions.

Heading Settings

From the compass, select **MENU**, and select **Setup Heading**.

Display: Sets the type of directional heading shown on the compass.

North Reference: Sets the north reference used on the compass.

Go To Line (Pointer): Sets the behavior of the pointer that appears on the map. Bearing points in the direction of your destination. Course shows your relationship to the course line leading to the destination.

Compass: Automatically switches from an electronic compass to a GPS compass when you are traveling at a higher rate of speed for a period of time.

Calibrate Compass: Allows you to calibrate the compass if you experience irregular compass behavior, for example, after moving long distances or after extreme temperature changes (*Calibrating the Compass*, page 10).

Trip Computer

The trip computer displays your current speed, average speed, trip odometer, and other helpful statistics. You can customize the trip computer layout, dashboard, and data fields.

Trip Computer Settings

From the trip computer, select MENU.

Reset: Resets all the trip computer values to zero. For accurate information, reset the trip information before beginning a trip.

Change Data Fields: Customizes the trip computer data fields.

Change Dashboard: Changes the theme and information displayed on the dashboard.

NOTE: Your customized settings are remembered by the dashboard. Your settings are not lost when you change profiles (*Profiles*, page 37).

Insert Page: Inserts an additional page of customizable data fields.

TIP: You can use the arrow keys to scroll through the pages.

Remove Page: Removes an additional page of customizable data fields.

More Data: Adds additional data fields to the trip computer.

Less Data: Removes data fields from the trip computer.

Restore Defaults: Restores the trip computer to factory default settings.

Altimeter

By default, the altimeter displays the elevation over the distance traveled. You can customize altimeter settings (*Altimeter Settings*, page 11). You can select any point on the plot to view details about that point.

Altimeter Plot Settings

From the altimeter, select MENU.

Reset: Resets the altimeter data, including waypoint, track, and trip data.

Altimeter Setup: Access additional altimeter settings (Altimeter Settings, page 11).

Adjust Zoom Ranges: Adjusts the zoom ranges shown on the altimeter page.

Change Data Fields: Allows you to customize the altimeter data fields.

Restore Defaults: Restores the altimeter to factory default settings.

Altimeter Settings

From the altimeter, select **MENU** > **Altimeter Setup**.

Auto Calibration: Once allows the altimeter to automatically calibrate one time when you start an activity. Continuous allows the altimeter to calibrate throughout the duration of your activity.

Barometer Mode: Variable Elevation allows the barometer to measure changes in elevation while you are moving. Fixed Elevation assumes the device is stationary at a fixed elevation, so the barometric pressure should only change due to weather.

Pressure Trending: Sets how the device records pressure data. Save Always records all pressure data, which can be helpful when you are watching for pressure fronts.

Plot Type: Records elevation changes over a period of time or distance, records barometric pressure over a period of time, or records ambient pressure changes over a period of time.

Calibrate Altimeter: Allows you to manually calibrate the barometric altimeter (*Calibrating the Barometric Altimeter*, page 12).

Using the Main Pages 11

Calibrating the Barometric Altimeter

You can manually calibrate the barometric altimeter if you know the correct elevation or the correct barometric pressure.

- 1 Go to a location where the elevation or barometric pressure is known.
- 2 From the altimeter, select MENU.
- 3 Select Altimeter Setup > Calibrate Altimeter.
- 4 Select **Method** to select the measurement to use in calibration.
- 5 Enter the measurement.
- 6 Select Calibrate.

Navigation

You can use the GPS navigation features on your device to navigate a saved activity, route, or course.

- Your device records your path as an activity. Activities use corridor navigation. When navigating a saved activity, it cannot be recalculated (*Recordings*, page 16).
- A route is a sequence of waypoints or locations that leads you to your destination. If you depart from the original route, the device recalculates the route and provides new directions (*Routes*, page 15).
- A course can have multiple destinations, and can be created point to point or on routable roads. When
 navigating a saved course, you can choose to navigate using the direct path with no map adjustments or
 recalculations, or following roads and trails with recalculations as needed. You can convert saved activities
 and routes to courses (*Courses*, page 18).

Navigating to a Destination

- 1 Select FIND.
- 2 Select a category.
- 3 Select a destination.
- 4 Select Go.

Your route appears as a magenta line on the map.

5 Navigate using the map (Navigating with the Map, page 12) or compass (Navigating with the Compass, page 12).

Navigating with the Map

- 1 Begin navigating to a destination (*Navigating to a Destination*, page 12).
- 2 Select Map.

A blue triangle represents your location on the map. As you travel, the blue triangle moves and displays your path.

- 3 Complete one or more actions:
 - To view different areas of the map, select ▲, ▼, ◄, or ►.

Navigating with the Compass

When navigating to a destination, $\mathbf{\Lambda}$ points to your destination, regardless of the direction you are moving.

- **1** Begin navigating to a destination (*Navigating to a Destination*, page 12).
- 2 Select Compass.
- 3 Turn until ▲ points toward the top of the compass, and continue moving in that direction to the destination.

Stopping Navigation

Select FIND > Stop Navigation.

Waypoints

Waypoints are locations you record and store in the device. Waypoints can mark where you are, where you are going, or where you have been. You can add details about the location, such as name, elevation, and depth.

You can add a .gpx file that contains waypoints by transferring the file to the GPX folder (*Transferring Files to Your Device*, page 41).

Creating a Waypoint

You can save your current location as a waypoint.

- 1 Select MARK.
- 2 If necessary, select a field to make changes to the waypoint.
- 3 Select Save.

Navigating to a Waypoint

- 1 Select FIND > Waypoints.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select Go.

By default, your route to the waypoint appears as a straight, colored line on the map.

Editing a Waypoint

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select an item to edit, such as the name.
- 4 Enter the new information, and select **Done**.

Deleting a Waypoint

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Delete.

Waypoint Averaging

You can refine a waypoint location for more accuracy. When averaging, the device takes several readings at the same location and uses the average value to provide more accuracy.

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Average Location.
- 4 Move to the waypoint location.
- 5 Select Start.
- 6 Follow the on-screen instructions.
- 7 When the confidence status bar reaches 100%, select Save.

For best results, collect four to eight samples for the waypoint, waiting at least 90 minutes between samples.

Projecting a Waypoint

You can create a new location by projecting the distance and bearing from a marked location to a new location.

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Project Waypoint.
- 4 Enter the bearing, and select **Done**.
- 5 Select a unit of measure.
- 6 Enter the distance, and select Done.
- 7 Select Save.

Moving a Waypoint on the Map

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Move Waypoint.
- 4 Select a location on the map.
- 5 Select Move.

Finding a Location Near a Waypoint

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Find Near Here.
- 4 Select a category.

The list displays locations near the selected waypoint.

Setting a Waypoint Proximity Alarm

You can add a proximity alarm for a waypoint. Proximity alarms alert you when you are within a specified range of a particular location.

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Set Proximity.
- 4 Enter the radius.

When you enter an area with a proximity alarm, the device sounds a tone.

Adding a Waypoint to a Route

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Add to Route.
- 4 Select a route.

Repositioning a Waypoint to Your Current Location

You can change the position of a waypoint. For example, if you move your vehicle, you can change the location to your current position.

- 1 Select Waypoint Manager.
- 2 Select a waypoint.
- 3 Select MENU > Reposition Here.

The waypoint location changes to your current location.

Routes

A route is a sequence of waypoints or locations that leads you to your final destination. Routes are saved as GPX files on the device.

Creating a Route

- 1 Select Route Planner > Create Route > Select First Point.
- 2 Select a category.
- 3 Select the first point in the route.
- 4 Select Use.
- 5 Select **Select Next Point** to add additional points to the route.
- 6 Select **OUIT** to save the route.

Navigating a Saved Route

- 1 Select FIND > Routes.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select Go.

By default, your route appears as a straight, colored line on the map.

Viewing the Active Route

- 1 While navigating a route, select **Active Route**.
- 2 Select a point in the route to view additional details.

Editing a Route

You can add, remove, or rearrange points on a route.

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select MENU > Edit Route.
- 4 Select a point.
- 5 Select an option:
 - · To view the point on the map, select **Review**.
 - To change the order of the points on the route, select **Move Up** or **Move Down**.
 - · To insert an additional point on the route, select Insert.
 - The additional point is inserted before the point you are editing.
 - · To remove the point from the route, select **Remove**.
- 6 Select **OUIT** to save the route.

Editing the Name of a Route

You can customize the name of a route to make it distinct.

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select MENU > Change Name.
- 4 Enter the new name.

Viewing a Route on the Map

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select the map tab.

Viewing the Elevation Plot of a Route

The elevation plot displays the elevations for a route based on your route setting. If your device is configured for direct routing, the elevation plot displays the straight-line elevations between route points. If your device is configured for on-road routing, the elevation plot displays the elevations along the roads included in your route.

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- **3** Select the elevation plot tab.

Reversing a Route

You can switch the start and end points of your route to navigate the route in reverse.

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select MENU > Reverse Route.

Deleting a Route

- 1 Select Route Planner.
- 2 Select a route.
- 3 Select MENU > Delete.

Recordings

Your device records your path as an activity. Activities contain information about points along your recorded path, including time and location for each point. Activities are saved as FIT files on the device.

Recording Settings

Select Setup > Recording.

Record Method: Sets the recording method. The Auto option records points at a variable rate to create an optimum representation of your path. You can also record points at specific time or distance intervals.

Interval: Sets the recording rate. Recording points more frequently creates a more-detailed path, but fills the recording log faster.

Auto Pause: Sets the device to stop recording your path when you are not moving.

Auto Start: Sets the device to start a new recording automatically when the previous recording ends.

Activity Type: Sets the default activity type for the device.

Advanced Setup: Enables you to open additional recording settings (Advanced Recording Settings, page 16).

Advanced Recording Settings

Select Setup > Recording > Advanced Setup.

Output Format: Sets the device to save the recording as a FIT or a GPX/FIT file (*File Types*, page 39). The FIT option records your activity with fitness information that is tailored for the Garmin Connect[®] application and can be used for navigation. The FIT and GPX option records your activity as both a traditional track that can be viewed on the map and used for navigation, and as an activity with fitness information.

GPX Auto Archive: Sets an automatic archive method to organize your recordings. Recordings are saved and cleared automatically.

Trip Recording: Sets a trip recording option.

Recorded Data Reset: Sets a reset option. The Activity and Trip option resets the recording and trip data when you finish the active recording. The Prompted option prompts you to select the data to reset.

Viewing the Current Activity

By default, the device automatically starts recording your path as an activity when it is turned on and has acquired satellite signals. You can pause and start recording manually.

- 1 Select Recording Controls.
- - To control the current activity recording, select
 - To view data fields for the activity, select 1.
 - To view the current activity on the map, select <a>C.
 - To view the elevation plot for the current activity, select ...

Navigating Using TracBack®

While recording, you can navigate back to the beginning of your activity. This can be helpful when finding your way back to camp or the trail head.

- 1 Select Recording Controls.
- 2 Select ▶ to switch to the map tab.
- 3 Select TracBack.

The map displays your route with a magenta line, start point, and end point.

4 Navigate using the map or the compass.

Stopping the Current Activity

- 1 From the main pages, select ENTER > Stop.
- 2 Select an option:
 - · To resume recording, select **Resume**.
 - To save the activity, select

TIP: You can view the saved activity by selecting Recorded Activities.

To delete the activity and reset the trip computer, select x̄.

Navigating a Saved Activity

- 1 Select FIND > Recorded Activities.
- 2 Select an activity.
- 3 Select Go.

Deleting a Saved Activity

- Select Recorded Activities.
- 2 Select an activity.
- 3 Select MENU > Delete.

Reversing an Activity

You can switch the start and end points of your activity to navigate the activity in reverse.

- 1 Select Recorded Activities.
- 2 Select an activity.
- 3 Select MENU > Copy Reversed.

Creating a Track from a Saved Activity

You can create a track from a saved activity. This allows you to share your track wirelessly with other compatible Garmin devices.

- 1 Select Recorded Activities.
- 2 Select an activity.
- 3 Select MENU > Save as Track.

Courses

A course can have multiple destinations, and can be navigated point to point or on routable roads. Courses are saved as FIT files on the device.

Creating a Course

- 1 Select Course Planner > Create Course.
- 2 Select a course creation method.
- 3 Select Select First Point.
- 4 Select a category.
- **5** Select the first point in the course.
- 6 Select Use.
- 7 Select **Select Next Point** to add additional points to the course.
- 8 Select Done.

Creating a Course Using the Map

- 1 Select Course Planner > Create Course.
- 2 Select a course creation method:

By default, your route appears as a straight, colored line on the map.

Editing a Course

- 3 Select MENU > Edit Course.
- 4 Select a point.
- 5 Select an option:
 - · To view the point on the map, select Review.
 - To edit the name of the point, select **Edit Name**.
 - To edit the symbol used to represent the point, select Edit Icon.
 - To change the order of the points on the course, select **Move Up** or **Move Down**.
 - · To insert an additional point on the course, select Insert Before.
 - The additional point is inserted before the point you are editing.
 - To receive an alert when you arrive at the point, select Alert on Arrival.
 - Points with alerts are generally destinations on your course. Points without alerts are used as shaping points on the course but are not destinations.
 - To remove the point from the course, select **Remove**.
- 6 Select QUIT to save the course.

Photo Viewer: Displays saved photos.

Waypoint Averaging: Allows you to refine a waypoint location for more accuracy (Waypoint Averaging, page 13).

Calculator: Displays a calculator.

Alarm Clock: Sets an audible alarm. If you are not currently using the device, you can set the device to turn on at a specific time.

VIRB Remote: Provides camera controls when you have a VIRB® device paired with your GPSMAP 66 series device (*Using the VIRB Remote*, page 29).

Stopwatch: Allows you to use a timer, mark a lap, and time laps.

Flashlight: Turns on the flashlight (Using the Flashlight, page 29).

 - To search the geocaches loaded on your device by name, select **Spell Search**, and enter a search term.
 - To search for geocaches near you or near another location, select Search Near, and select a location.
 If you are connected to www.geocaching.com, the search results include live geocache data obtained by GC Live Download.
 - To search for live geocaches by code, select GC Live Download > GC Code, and enter the geocache code.
 This feature allows you to download a specific geocache from www.geocaching.com when you know the geocache code.

 - · To view a clue about a geocache location, select Hint.
 - To view latitude and longitude for a geocache, select Coordinates.
 - To view feedback about the geocache from previous searchers, select Logs.
 - To turn chirp[™] searching on, select chirp[™].

chirp

A chirp is a small Garmin accessory that is programmed and left in a geocache. You can use your device to find a chirp in a geocache.

Enabling chirp Searching

- 2 Select chirp™ Searching > On.

Finding a Geocache with a chirp

- 1 With chirp searching enabled, navigate to a geocache.
 - When you are within approximately 10 m (33 ft.) of the geocache that contains a chirp, details about the chirp appear.
- 2 Select Show Details.
- 3 If necessary, select **Go** to navigate to the next stage of the geocache.

Removing Live Geocache Data from the Device

You can remove live geocache data to show only geocaches manually loaded on the device using a computer.

Select Setup > Geocaching > Geocaching Live > Remove Live Data.

Live geocaching data is removed from the device and no longer appears in the geocache list.

RINEX Logging: Enables the device to write Receiver Independent Exchange Format (RINEX) data to a system file. RINEX is a data interchange format for raw satellite navigation system data.

Battery Type: Allows you to change the type of AA battery you are using.

NOTE: This setting is disabled when the NiMH battery pack is installed.

Satellite Settings

Select Setup > System > Satellite.

NOTE: Some settings may not be available for all device models.

Satellite System: Sets the satellite system to GPS only, multiple satellite systems, or Demo Mode (GPS off).

WAAS/EGNOS: Enables the system to use Wide Area Augmentation System/European Geostationary Navigation Overlay Service (WAAS/EGNOS) data.

Multi-Band: Enables the use of multi-band systems on the GPSMAP 66sr device.

NOTE: Multi-band systems use multiple frequency bands and allow for more consistent track logs and improved positioning when using the device in challenging environments.

GPS and Other Satellite Systems

Using GPS and another satellite system together offers increased performance in challenging environments and faster position acquisition than using GPS only. However, using multiple systems can reduce battery life more quickly than using GPS only.

Your device can use these Global Navigation Satellite Systems (GNSS). Multi-band systems use multiple frequency bands and allow for more consistent track logs, improved positioning, improved multi-path errors, and fewer atmospheric errors when using the device in challenging environments. GPS: A satellite constellation built by the United States.

GPS multi-band: A satellite constellation built by the United States, using the enhanced L5 signal.

GLONASS: A satellite constellation built by Russia.

GALILEO: A satellite constellation built by the European Space Agency.

GALILEO multi-band: A satellite constellation built by the European Space Agency, using the enhanced L5 signal.

QZSS multi-band: A satellite constellation built by Japan, using the enhanced L5 signal.

IRNSS (NavIC): A satellite constellation built by India, using the enhanced L5 signal.

Serial Interface Settings

Select Setup > System > Interface.

Garmin Spanner: Allows you to use the device USB port with most NMEA 0183-compliant mapping programs by creating a virtual serial port.

Garmin Serial: Sets the device to use a Garmin proprietary format to exchange waypoint, route, and track data with a computer.

NMEA In/Out: Sets the device to use standard NMEA 0183 output and input.

Text Out: Provides simple ASCII text output of location and velocity information.

MTP: Sets the device to use Media Transfer Protocol (MTP) to access the file system on the device instead of mass storage mode.

Display Settings

Select Setup > Display.

Backlight Timeout: Adjusts the length of time before the backlight turns off.

Battery Save: Saves the battery power and prolongs the battery life by turning off the screen when the backlight times out.

Appearance: Changes the appearance of the display background and selection highlight (*Changing the Color Mode*, page 33).

Screen Capture: Allows you to save the image on the device screen.

Review Text Size: Changes the size of the text on the screen.

Changing the Color Mode

 - To allow the device to display day or night colors automatically based on the time of day, select Mode > Auto.
 - To use a light background, select Mode > Day.

Bluetooth Settings

Select Setup > Bluetooth.

Status: Enables Bluetooth wireless technology, and shows current connection status.

Notifications: Shows or hides smartphone notifications.

Forget Phone: Removes the connected device from the list of paired devices. This option is available only after a device is paired.

Wi-Fi Settings

Select Setup > Wi-Fi.

Wi-Fi: Enables wireless technology.

Add Network: Allows you to scan for and connect to a wireless network.

Routing Settings

The available routing settings vary based on whether Direct Routing is enabled or disabled.

Select Setup > Routing.

Direct Routing: Enables or disables direct routing. Direct routing calculates the most direct route possible to the destination.

Activity: Sets an activity while routing. The device calculates routes optimized for the type of activity you are doing.

Lock On Road: Locks the blue triangle, which represents your position on the map, onto the nearest road. This is most useful when driving or navigating on roads.

Course Navigation: Sets the method used to calculate courses and routes. The Direct Path option is used for point-to-point navigation without recalculation. The Roads & Trails option adjusts the course to follow map data, recalculating as needed.

Route Transitions: Sets how the device routes from one point on the route to the next. This setting is available only for some activities. The Distance option routes you to the next point on the route when you are within a specified distance of your current point.

Advanced Setup: Allows you to customize additional routing settings (Advanced Routing Settings, page 33).

Advanced Routing Settings

Select Setup > Routing > Advanced Setup.

Calculation Method: Sets the method used to calculate your route.

Off Route Recalculation: Sets recalculation preferences when navigating away from an active route.

Avoidance Setup: Sets the types of roads, terrain, and transportation methods to avoid while navigating.

Setting the Device Tones

You can customize tones for messages, keys, turn warnings, and alarms.

- 1 Select Setup > Tones > Tones > On.
- 2 Select a tone for each audible type.

Geocaching Settings

Select Setup > Geocaching.

Geocaching Live: Allows you to remove live geocache data from your device and remove your device registration from geocaching.com (*Removing Live Geocache Data from the Device*, page 28, *Removing Your Device Registration From Geocaching.com*, page 28).

Geocache Style: Sets the device to display the geocache list using names or codes.

chirp™ Searching: Allows the device to search for a geocache containing a chirp accessory (*Enabling chirp Searching*, page 28).

Program chirp™: Programs the chirp accessory.

Filter Setup: Allows you to create and save custom filters for geocaches (*Saving a Custom Geocache Filter*, page 27).

Found Geocaches: Allows you to edit the number of geocaches found. This number automatically increases when you log a find (*Logging the Attempt*, page 27).

Wireless Sensors

Your device can be used with wireless ANT+ or Bluetooth sensors. For more information about compatibility and purchasing optional sensors, go to buy garmin.com.

Pairing Your Wireless Sensors

Before you can pair, you must put on the heart rate monitor or install the sensor.

Pairing is the connecting of wireless sensors using ANT+ or Bluetooth technology, for example, connecting a heart rate monitor with your device.

Fishing (requires marine maps) displays a detailed view of bottom contours and depth soundings and simplifies map presentation for optimal use while fishing.

Appearance: Sets the appearance of marine navigation aids on the map.

Marine Alarm Setup: Sets alarms for when you exceed a specified drift distance while anchored, when you are off course by a specified distance, and when you enter water of a specific depth.

Marine Speed Filter: Averages the speed of your vessel over a short period of time for smoother speed values.

Menu Settings

Menu Style: Changes the appearance of the main menu.

Page Sequence: Allows you to move, add, and delete items in the page sequence (*Changing the Page Sequence*, page 36).

Setup: Changes the order of items in the setup menu.

Find: Changes the order of items in the find menu.

Customizing the Main Menu

You can move, add, and delete items in the main menu.

- 1 From the main menu, select MENU > Change Item Order.
- 2 Select a menu item.
- 3 Select an option:
 - · Select Move to change the placement of the item in the list.
 - · Select Insert to add a new item to the list.
 - Select Remove to delete an item from the list.

Changing the Page Sequence

Profiles

Profiles are a collection of settings that optimize your device based on how you are using it. For example, the settings and views are different when you use the device for hunting than when geocaching.

When you are using a profile and you change settings, such as data fields or units of measurement, the changes are saved automatically as part of the profile.

 - To reset data specific to a trip, such as distance and averages, select Reset Trip Data.
 - · To delete all saved waypoints, select **Delete All Waypoints**.
 - To clear the data recorded since you started your current activity, select Clear Current Activity.
 - **NOTE:** The device continues to record new data for the current activity.
 - To reset only the settings for your current activity profile to the factory default values, select Reset Profile Settings.
 - To reset all device settings and profiles to the factory default values, select Reset All Settings.
 - **NOTE:** Resetting all settings clears all geocaching activity from your device. It does not remove your saved user data, such as tracks and waypoints.
 - To remove all saved user data and reset all settings on the device to the factory default values, select Delete All.

NOTE: Deleting all settings removes your personal data, history, and saved user data, including tracks and waypoints.



24 hr. Max. Temperature: The maximum temperature recorded in the last 24 hours from a compatible temperature sensor.

24 hr. Min. Temperature: The minimum temperature recorded in the last 24 hours from a compatible temperature sensor.

Accuracy of GPS: The margin of error for your exact location. For example, your GPS location is accurate to within +/- 3.65 m (12 ft.).

Activity Distance: The distance traveled for the current track or activity.

Alarm Timer: The current time of the countdown timer.

Ambient Pressure: The uncalibrated ambient pressure.

Ascent - Average: The average vertical distance of ascent since the last reset.

Ascent - Maximum: The maximum rate of ascent in feet per minute or meters per minute since the last reset.

Ascent - Total: The total elevation distance ascended during the activity or since the last reset.

Automotive Turn: The direction of the next turn in the route. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Average Cadence: Cycling. The average cadence for the current activity.

Average HR %Max.: The average percentage of maximum heart rate for the current activity.

Average Lap: The average lap time for the current activity.

Avg. HR: The average heart rate for the current activity.

Barometer: The calibrated current pressure.

Battery Level: The remaining battery power.

Bearing: The direction from your current location to a destination. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

ETA at Destination: The estimated time of day when you will reach the final destination (adjusted to the local time of the destination). You must be navigating for this data to appear.

ETA at Next: The estimated time of day when you will reach the next waypoint on the route (adjusted to the local time of the waypoint). You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Glide Ratio: The ratio of horizontal distance traveled to the change in vertical distance.

Glide Ratio to Dest.: The glide ratio required to descend from your current position to the destination elevation. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

GPS Elevation: The altitude of your current location using GPS.

GPS Heading: The direction you are moving based on GPS.

Speed Limit: The reported speed limit for the road. Not available in all maps and in all areas. Always rely on posted road signs for actual speed limits.

Speed - Maximum: The highest speed reached since the last reset.

Speed - Moving Avg.: The average speed while moving since the last reset.

Speed - Overall Avg.: The average speed while moving and stopped since the last reset.

Stopwatch Timer: The stopwatch time for the current activity.

Sunrise: The time of sunrise based on your GPS position.

Sunset: The time of sunset based on your GPS position.

Temperature: The temperature of the air. Your body temperature affects the temperature sensor. Your device must be connected to a tempe[™] sensor for this data to appear.

Temperature - Water: The temperature of the water. Your device must be connected to a NMEA 0183 device capable of acquiring the water temperature.

Time of Day: The time of day based on your current location and time settings (format, time zone, daylight saving time).

Time to Destination: The estimated time remaining before you reach the destination. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Velocity Made Good: The speed at which you are closing on a destination along a route. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Vertical Dist. to Dest.: The elevation distance between your current position and the final destination. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Vertical Dist. to Next: The elevation distance between your current position and the next waypoint in the route. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Vertical Speed: The rate of ascent or descent over time.

Vertical Speed to Dest.: The rate of ascent or descent to a predetermined altitude. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Waypoint at Dest.: The last point on the route to the destination. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

Waypoint at Next: The next point on the route. You must be navigating for this data to appear.

tempe

The tempe is an ANT+ wireless temperature sensor. You can attach the sensor to a secure strap or loop where it is exposed to ambient air, and therefore, provides a consistent source of accurate temperature data. You must pair the tempe with your device to display temperature data from the tempe.

Tips for Pairing ANT+ Accessories with Your Garmin Device

- · Verify that the ANT+ accessory is compatible with your Garmin device.
- Before you pair the ANT+ accessory with your Garmin device, move 10 m (33 ft.) away from other ANT+ accessories.
- Bring the Garmin device within range 3 m (10 ft.) of the ANT+ accessory.
- After you pair the first time, your Garmin device automatically recognizes the ANT+ accessory each time it
 is activated. This process occurs automatically when you turn on the Garmin device and only takes a few
 seconds when the accessories are activated and functioning correctly.
- When paired, your Garmin device receives data from only your accessory, and you can go near other accessories.

If the device stops responding, you may need to restart it. This does not erase any of your data or settings.

- 1 Remove the batteries.
- 2 Reinstall the batteries.

Restarting the GPSMAP 66sr Device

If the device stops responding, you may need to restart it. This does not erase any of your data or settings. Hold the power button for approximately 30 seconds.

About Heart Rate Zones

Many athletes use heart rate zones to measure and increase their cardiovascular strength and improve their level of fitness. A heart rate zone is a set range of heartbeats per minute. The five commonly accepted heart rate zones are numbered from 1 to 5 according to increasing intensity. Generally, heart rate zones are calculated based on percentages of your maximum heart rate.

Fitness Goals

Knowing your heart rate zones can help you measure and improve your fitness by understanding and applying these principles.

- · Your heart rate is a good measure of exercise intensity.
- Training in certain heart rate zones can help you improve cardiovascular capacity and strength.

If you know your maximum heart rate, you can use the table (*Heart Rate Zone Calculations*, page 47) to determine the best heart rate zone for your fitness objectives.

If you do not know your maximum heart rate, use one of the calculators available on the Internet. Some gyms and health centers can provide a test that measures maximum heart rate. The default maximum heart rate is 220 minus your age.

Heart Rate Zone Calculations

Zone	% of Maximum Heart Rate	Perceived Exertion	Benefits
1	50-60%	Relaxed, easy pace, rhythmic breathing	Beginning-level aerobic training, reduces stress
2	60-70%	Comfortable pace, slightly deeper breathing, conversation possible	Basic cardiovascular training, good recovery pace
3	70-80%	Moderate pace, more difficult to hold conversation	Improved aerobic capacity, optimal cardiovascular training
4	80-90%	Fast pace and a bit uncomfortable, breathing forceful	Improved anaerobic capacity and threshold, improved speed
5	90-100%	Sprinting pace, unsustainable for long period of time, labored breathing	Anaerobic and muscular endurance, increased power

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
